# Maxwell makes IFLY safe

iFLY Indoor Skydiving experience recently opened its first Ohio location in the Liberty Center, a \$350 million mixed-use complex in Liberty Township. The experiential entertainment company, which simulate freefall conditions in a vertical wind tunnel, opened adjacent to Dick's Sporting Goods in 2018 in a building with updated architecture compared to other locations.

iFLY has flown more than 8 million people in a dozen countries and at sea since launching the modern vertical wind tunnel industry in 1998. The company has 67 facilities operating in the United States, Canada, Europe and Asia with 28 whollyowned in the United States and "significant growth plans" worldwide in the next two

years, according to Liberty Center officials.

indoor skydiving facility.
They coordinated their work
with the electrical contractor
in order to get lightning
conductors concealed from
the roof to the ground.

According to Adam Maxwell, LP, Project Manager/field Foreman with Maxwell, "Because of the build of the structure, safety requirements were 100% tie off on the roof level and it has a five-inch parapet wall which would be difficult work for anyone untrained in our scope of work." The job went smooth and was completed on time.

"We see this as being a very large draw for us," said Tracy Kocher, Marketing Director for the Butler County Visitors Bureau. "It also pairs nicely with our (Start Skydiving) facility up in Middletown, so we'll have both options available, people who actually want to skydive from a plane or just try it out with this indoor skydiving facility."

#### Northridge School Rehab **Chapel Electric**

Chapel Electric is in the final stages of construction at the new Northridge Local School building located just off of Dixie Drive, in Dayton OH. Dan Miller is Chapel's Project

Manager and John Dailey is the General Foremen.

The \$45 million construction project started in 2017 and is

scheduled to open this fall, right in time for the 2019/2020 school year. The facility will house all of school district's students from pre-kindergarten through 12th grade. Shook Touchstone is the

construction manager on the new 203,000-square-foot facility which also includes a large commercial serving kitchen and large activity rooms with an open concept in design along with a complete renovation of the School's existing auditoriumgymnasium. The Shook Touchstone / Chapel team also recently completed a \$22 million project at Bethel Schools in Miami County and a \$46 million project at Greenville City Schools in Darke County.

When Northridge's new K-12 school opens it will be the first school in the State with a BluePoint Alert security system, designed to help keep our students and faculty safe. The facility is powered by a 3200A service and a 125KW Generator and Emergency

The hospital will provide inpatient rehabilitation services and higher medical management for patients recovering

rehabilitation hospital, to be named the Rehabilitation Institute of Ohio. The hospital is located across from the Miami Valley Hospital campus at the intersection of Apple St. and South Main St.

The freestanding inpatient rehabilitation hospital will include 60 private patient rooms, a spacious therapy gym, an in-house pharmacy, courtyard, four-chair dialysis suite, three bariatric rooms, an isolation room, dining room, and dayroom areas.

Project partners include the architect Gresham Smith, Doster Construction from Birmingham, and Admiral Engineering. ESI Electrical Contractors, Inc. of Dayton is contracted to perform all

complex orthopedic conditions. Patients will receive access to advanced technologies, therapy and 24hour nursing care.

Construction is anticipated to be completed in spring of 2020.

This \$62 million facility includes a 260,000 squarefoot, two-story building and is being erected on vacant land in Xenia at U.S. 35 and U.S. 68. The project is slated to be finished by July 2020 and open in time for the 2020-2021 school year. While the concept is focused on aerospace, the building, the labs and the classrooms have been designed to provide flexibility for the career center, which will allow them to change their programs as the needs of the community and industry evolve in the future. Students will have

Chapel Electic is working together with ESI Electrical Contractors on this project. All technology systems will be provided and installed by Chapel Romanoff Technologies (CRT). Chapel will employ many GCCC students who are working on a co-op basis during their summer break.

The project includes a specialty LED lighting package, dual 3000-amp services with a 300KW generator and emergency backup system. There are 2 complete commercial kitchens (a serving kitchen for the students and faculty and a Culinary Arts kitchen).
